4th Grade Science 3rd Quarter Outline

The book, *Scott Foresman Science* will be used for fourth grade science. During the second quarter, we will complete a unit on Earth science. Students will learn the water cycle and how it affects weather, how to classify rocks and minerals, how rocks and minerals form, what forces shape our planet, how we use natural resources, and the importance of conserving God's creation. Students will participate in daily discussions, practice using science vocabulary, complete weekly informal assessments, as well as formal assessments at the end of each topic. The following concepts give specific objectives for each lesson.

Hurricanes and Tornadoes

- Lesson 1: Identify how tropical storms become hurricanes.
Identify the stages of a tropical storm.
Describe a hurricane as a system.
- Lesson 2: Describe the effects of winds from tropical storms.
Describes the effects of water from tropical storms.
Explain how scientists can predict hurricanes
Describe what a hurricane model is used for.
- Lesson 3: Define a tornado and how it forms.
Compare a tornado to dust devils and waterspouts
Describe the vortex of a tornado
Explain how scientists can forecast tornadoes
Use a chart to classify tornadoes.
Understand proper procedures to take during tornado warnings.
Compare and contrast hurricanes and tornadoes.

Rocks and Minerals

- Lesson 1: Students understand the properties of minerals
Students recognize color, luster, hardness, and streak as ways
scientists classify minerals.
- Lesson 2: Explain that larger rocks can be broken down into smaller rocks
Rocks are broken down into sediment.
Sediment can combine with organic material to form soil
Describe how rocks form from sediment.

Identify what information scientists can learn from studying fossils
Describe the steps involved in fossil formation.
Summarize how a geologic time scale can be used to find the age of rocks.

Lesson 3: Identify properties of igneous rocks
Describe in detail how igneous rocks are formed.
Describe the relationship between crystal size and rate of cooling in igneous rocks.
Identify properties of metamorphic rocks
Describe in detail how metamorphic rocks form
Identify basic patterns and sequences of the rock cycle

Earth's Changing Surface

Lesson 1: Identify landforms as features on earth's surface
Explain that some changes in the earth's surface are due to slow processes and some changes are due to rapid processes.

Compare and contrast physical weathering and chemical weathering.

Lesson 2: Understand erosion and deposition as two forces that move weathered materials.
Identify gravity as a factor that affects earth's surface
Understand that the earth is constantly changing.

Lesson 3: Identify volcanoes as a landform that can rapidly change earth's surface.
Distinguish between active, dormant, and extinct volcanoes
Identify effects of volcanoes to all spheres of earth.
Identify activity at faults as the cause of earthquakes

5th Grade Social Studies 3rd Quarter Review

The book *Harcourt Social Studies The United States: Making a New Nation* will be used for fifth grade social studies. During the third quarter, we will complete units on the Southern Colonies, the colonies uniting against the king, and the Revolutionary War. Students will read, complete daily reviews, and homework to reinforce concepts introduced in class. Students will also take a formal assessment at the end of each chapter.

The following concepts give specific objectives for each lesson.

The Southern Colonies

Lesson 1: Settling the South

- Describe the location and physical setting of the southern colonies.
- Explain why the southern colonies were founded
- Discuss how slavery affected the southern colonies.
- Compare and analyze maps with different scales.
- Understand why maps need to have different scales.
- Measure distances on a map.

Lesson 2: Life in the South

- Describe how slavery influenced daily life in the Southern colonies
- Identify ways in which enslaved African Americans dealt with the Hardships of their lives.
- Describe what government was like in the Southern colonies.
- Explain the role religion played in the southern colonists lives.
- Explain how Olaudah Equiano was brought to North America as an enslaved worker.

Lesson 3: The Southern Economy

- Understand how geography affected the economy of the Southern Colonies.
- Identify the major industries of the Southern Colonies.
- Understand social and economic life in colonial Williamsburg.
- Describe how a living-history museum works.

The Colonies Unite

Lesson 1: Fighting for Control

- Describe the fight to control North America.
- Describe how alliances between Native Americans and colonists affected the French and Indian war.
- Explain the new laws passed after the French and Indian War.
- Identify on maps lands in North America claimed by different European nations.
- Collect, analyze, and compare information given on historical maps.

Lesson 2: Colonists Speak Out

- Identify laws that caused conflicts in the colonies.
- Explain the importance of the committees of correspondence.
- examine the life of Patrick Henry and his views and impact during the American Revolution.

Lesson 3: Disagreements Grow

- Explain why the colonists refused to accept the new laws passed by Parliament.
- Describe why fighting broke out at Lexington and Concord.
- Recognize different points of view about who should govern the colonies.

Lesson 4: The Road to War

- Explain the significance of the Second Continental Congress.
- Understand the importance of the Battle of Bunker Hill.
- Examine how Phillis Wheatley's poetry reflected the patriotic spirit of her time.

Lesson 5: Declaring Independence

- Understand the people and events associated with the Declaration of Independence.
- Tell why the Declaration of Independence is important and identify its key political concepts.
- Identify and explain the multiple causes and effects of historical events.
- Analyze the causes and effects of British imperial policies in the 13 colonies.

The Revolutionary War

Lesson 1: Americans and the Revolution

- Describe the personal and economic effects of the war.
- Explain the roles of women, African Americans, and Native Americans during the war.
- Interpret parallel times lines to understand the sequence of historical events.
- Analyze the events leading up to the Revolutionary War.

Lesson 2: Fighting for Independence

- Identify the early battles, campaigns, and turning points of the Revolution.
- Examine the roles of American and British leaders.
- Describe how individual and other nations contributed to the war's outcome.
- Understand how Bernardo de Galvez contributed to the American victory in the Revolutionary War.
- Understand the hardships of daily life for Revolutionary War soldiers.
- Examine the artifacts used during the revolutionary war.

Lesson 3: Winning Independence

- Identify the major battles and campaigns of the Revolutionary War.
- Describe how individuals and other nations contributed to the war's outcome.
- Distinguish fact from fiction by comparing documentary sources on historical figures and events with fictionalized characters and events.
- Analyze the end of the Revolutionary War.

Lesson 4: Effects of the War

- Evaluate how the Declaration of Independence changed views on slavery.
- Understand the significance of new land policies and their impact on Native Americans.
